### VPNA PRESENTS STRONG MAYOR FORUM

You've heard the heated rhetoric, the charges and counter charges, and the ad hominem attacks. Now come decide for yourself as representatives of the major groups supporting and

opposing the Strong Mayor proposal square off in a debate at our February 10 general meeting.

Whether you are for or against the proposal, or somewhere in between, it is undeniable that the Strong Mayor referendum

represents one of the most exciting exercises in direct democracy that Dallas had seen in many years. The referendum has the potential for creating profound change in the way the City is run by abolishing the City Manager and vesting all executive power in the hands of the mayor. Whether such a change would be for good or for ill is the subject of passionate views on both sides. And their representatives are anxious to make their case to residents of Vickery Place.

Beth Ann Blackwood, credited with initiating the referendum, has tentatively agreed to appear on behalf of Citizens for a Strong Mayor, the political action committee formed to spearhead support for the measure. In November Ms. Blackwood turned in 30,000 signatures to the City Secretary to put her Strong Mayor plan on the May 7 ballot.

The political action committee formed in opposition, Coalition for Strong Government, also has agreed to participate. The Coalition for Strong Government was formed at the instance of several City Council members who oppose the Blackwood proposal. At press time, the opposition group had yet to propose its representative. VPNA vice president Bruce Thomas will moderate the debate.

In addition to the two groups presently invited, it is possible that other groups, pro or con, may emerge and also will be invited to participate in the VPNA Strong Mayor Forum. But to be sure, YOU are invited. So come armed with your questions and demand straight talk on the Strong Mayor. It promises to be an exciting and informative

## NEIGHBORS GATHER FOR FIRST VPNA MEETING OF NEW YEAR

The January meeting of the Vickery Place Neighborhood Association was both informative and well attended. Several neighbors mentioned that their New Year's Resolution is to get more involved in neighborhood and community activities.

New board member, Lindsey LeCuyer, chaired the meeting and introduced the officers and members of the 2005 board.

John Franz, Nationwide Insurance, shared knowledge on various types of homeowner policies available in Texas as well as information on the black mold "epidemic".

Beth Bentley gave an overview of the recent "Teardown" meeting hosted by the City of Dallas as part of the "Forward

Dallas Comprehensive Plan". She also reported on the status of Vickery Place Conservation District efforts and stated that the City Planning Department is targeting early summer of 2005 to perform a feasibility study of Vickery Place.

Lindsey opened the meeting to questions and suggestions from the floor. A variety of issues including new major projects such as paid security patrol, alley paving and sidewalk paving along with program topics for the coming year were discussed. Additional concerns voiced by Vickery Place residents included code violations, stray animals, irresponsible pet owners, bulky trash and graffiti. Neighbors also showed an interest in a Vickery Place directory and an e-mail hot line.

Committee sign up sheets were made available and people were encouraged to volunteer for the coming year.

As always, our thanks to Vickery Towers for providing us with a great meeting spot and to our neighbors who make Vickery Place such a great place to live. See you next month.





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### CONSERVATION LITE: SOLUTION TO NEW BUILD INFILL?

Neighborhood residents and Dallas City staff were well represented at the Forward Dallas! "Tear-down" meeting on Monday, January 14th at the Lake Highlands Freshman Center. City Council members Veletta Forsyth-Lill (District 14), Lois Finkelman (District 11), Gary Griffith (District 9), and Bill Blaydes (10) were present, along with Theresa O'Donnell, Director of Development Services and John Fregonese, Urban Planner for the City of Dallas Comprehensive Plan. Daniel Kerry, from the National Trust for Historic Preservation of Ft Worth was also on hand. Neighborhoods represented included Lakewood Heights, Lakewood, Greenland Hills, Vickery Place, Edgemont Park, Preston Forest, Preston Royal, Preston Hollow North, Preston Hollow East, Bluffview, Munger Place, Peak Suburban, and the Love Field area. Other contributing remarks came from Ann Abernathy, Preservation Dallas and Neil Emmons, City Planning Commissioner/Landmark Commissioner.

Mr. Fregonese started with an overview of comments/concerns gathered from the previous meeting in November 2004, the main one being: 'teardowns and new infill are destroying the appeal of the traditional neighborhoods'—loss of privacy (max lot size), loss of daylight, loss of open space, incompatible architecture. Some things people would like to see happening in their neighborhoods—house/lot ratio, floor area ratio (FAR), and close access to shopping/food.



A Question and Answer/Comment period followed, which covered a variety of concerns in regard to the teardown/new build phenomena: inconsistent set backs of newer built homes (breaks up the streetscape and blocks your safety line of vision); drainage problems as a result of homes being built up higher than their neighbors; more traffic on residential streets; more noise (many stated that workers began before 7 a.m.); no response from the City on called in building code violations; older trees being torn down; dust and pollutants in the air from demolition; varying heights and styles of newer homes compared to surrounding older homes. The quote of the night came from a man who has resided in Preston Hollow for the past 20 years, "I now live in a new neighborhood, and I didn't move!" The City graciously listened to

anyone and everyone who expressed their thoughts and concerns.

Ms. O'Donnell then introduced some tools the City hopes to implement in the coming months. These would be less regulatory but easier and quicker to issue than the current Conservation or Historic District ordinances—or as

Theresa put it, "Conservation Lite". These new zoning tools, which are still being developed by the Planning Dept., would look at floor area ratio (FAR), lot coverage, impervious surface (concrete, etc.), shadow casting (sunlight blockage) and set backs.

City staff will take all of this information back to their drawing boards and will schedule a follow up meeting sometime in March. Check your March newsletter for further information or go to www.forwarddallas.org.



## ANNUAL ST. PATRICK'S DAY CELEBRATION ON LOWER GREENVILLE:

Get ready! **Saturday, March 12, 2005** is the date for this year's annual Lower Greenville St. Patrick's Day Celebration, when thousands of partygoers will invade Lower Greenville (and parts of Vickery Place). The resulting impact to the neighborhoods is high traffic, parking congestion, litter, and noise.

Area neighborhoods, including Vickery Place, will be coordinating preparatory measures, through the City's St. Patrick's Day Task Force Committee. The Committee will meet at City Hall on Thursday, February 17<sup>th</sup>, 2:00 pm, to discuss this year's event and to make final plans for dealing with the large traffic and parking problem.



As in past years, VPNA will distribute the City's official map of the event, explaining the traffic management system that will be implemented with the March VPNA Newsletter. The City will be providing temporary No-Parking signs that must be placed by VP residents.

VPNA will host a sign building party—time and place still to be determined. *All VP residents are invited to come help build the signs.* With approximately 200 signs to assemble, we will need all the extra hands and hammers we can muster! ### FOR LOVE OR MONEY

A young Frenchman, Charles, Duke of Orleans, was one of the earliest creators of valentines, called "poetical or amorous addresses." From his confinement in the Tower of London after the Battle of Agincourt in 1415, he sent several poems or rhymed love letters or "valentines" to his wife in France.

During the fifteenth century, one valentine showed a drawing of a knight and a lady, with Cupid in the act of sending an arrow to pierce the knight's heart.

During the seventeenth century people made their own valentines using original verse or poems copied from booklets with appropriate verse.

The first U.S. made valentines were crafted by a Mount Holyoke College student, Miss Esther Howland. Her father, a stationer in Worcester, MA, imported valentines every year from England. Esther, however, decided to create her own valentine messages. Around 1830 she began importing lace, fine papers, and other supplies for her valentines. She employed several assistants and her brothers helped market her "Worcester" valentines. As one of our first successful U.S. career women her sales amounted to about a hundred thousand dollars annually—not bad for the 1830's. http://www.techdirect.com/valentine/history.html

### **CHOCOLATE COVERED STRAWBERRIES AND CHAMPAGNE**

Even the non-cook will love this recipe.

- · Purchase your favorite Champagne and chill.
- · Buy fresh strawberries that have their stems intact. Wash, and dry well.
- · Chocolate dip: buy Bark Coating (available at your local grocery store). Melt in double boiler on top of the stove or in a microwavable safe container in the microwave--follow directions on the back of the package. Dip strawberries in the melted coating. Place on wax or parchment paper to harden. Serve your Valentine!



### **VICKERY PLACE RECYCLES**

Recycling has many benefits including helping to reduce the need for land fills, helping to decrease the emissions of greenhouse gases that contribute to global warming and helping to conserve natural resources. Luckily, the City of Dallas offers trash collection recycling. Help in the City's conservation efforts by following these easy guidelines.

In a brown paper bag, you may include:

- · Newspapers and inserts.
- · Mixed paper: magazines, junk mail and home/office paper.
- · Chipboard, such as dry food boxes free of wax paper.

In a translucent blue bag, 13 gallons or larger in size, you may include:

- · Glass containers, unbroken and rinsed.
- · Plastic bottles with codes 1, 2 or 3, rinsed and without caps.
- · Flattened steel/tin food cans.
- · Aerosol cans that are empty (no paint or hazardous waste cans.)

Translucent blue bags can be purchased at most of the area grocery stores in the trash bag aisle. Although it is recommended that materials be crushed and flattened to save space within blue bags, this is not a requirement.

Collection is on Thursdays and the recyclable material should be placed beside your roll cart on that day. Please make sure the containers are closed so that content does not blow into the street or alley. Set the items out only on scheduled pick up day so that they are not confused with bulky trash which could result in a fine.
